Unfinished Business and General Orders:

1. Consideration of the Compliance with the Statement of Benefits as filed and represented by High RE 3940, LLC d.b.a., Culver's 3950 Ridge Road, Highland. At its meeting of January 30, 2012, the Highland Town Council approved this application for property tax abatement upon the increase in assessed value in consequence of construction of a new building a Culver's Restaurant 3940 and 3950 Ridge Road, for a period of time not to exceed ten (10) calendar years, according to the schedule in IC 6-1.1-12.1-4(d)(10), subject to continuing compliance with the statement of benefits, IC 6-1.1-12.1 et seq., and terms of the approving resolution. This represents the first review of compliance for this property.

The Redevelopment Director offered a report on the status of compliance. She recommending finding favorably.

Councilor Zemen moved, seconded by Councilor Vassar to find the abatement in compliance with the statement of benefits and to permit the abatement to continue. Upon a roll call vote, there were four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The property owner was in compliance with the terms of the statement of benefits and the abatement was permitted to continue.

2. Consideration of the Compliance with the Statement of Benefits as filed and represented by Baldi-Hoobyar Equities Indiana LLC d.b.a., Highland Volkswagen,

9601 Indianapolis Boulevard, Highland. At its meeting of October 10, 2012 and confirmed at its meeting of December 10, 2012, the Highland Town Council approved this application for property tax abatement upon the increase in assessed value in consequence of construction of a new building a Volkswagen Retail Dealership, 9601,9553 and 9545 Indianapolis Boulevard, Highland, for a period of time not to exceed ten (10) calendar years, according to the schedule in IC 6-1.1-12.1-4(d)(10), subject to continuing compliance with the statement of benefits, IC 6-1.1-12.1 et seq., and terms of the approving resolution. This represents the first review of compliance for this property.

It was noted that Mr. Hoobyar was present for the action by the Town Council.

The Redevelopment Director offered a report on the status of compliance. She recommending finding favorably.

Councilor Wagner moved, seconded by Councilor Vassar to find the abatement in compliance with the statement of benefits and to permit the abatement to continue. Upon a roll call vote, there were four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The property owner was in compliance with the terms of the statement of benefits and the abatement was permitted to continue.

3. **Proposed Ordinance No. 1586:** An Ordinance to Amend Sections 12.05.120 (B)(3) and (D)(9) of the Highland Municipal Code Regarding the Department of Waterworks Regarding Certain Rates and Charges, all Pursuant to IC 36-1-4, IC 36-1-5, IC 8-1.5-3-8.1 and IC 8-1,5-4 et seq. (The Board of Waterworks Directors passed and adopted Water Resolution No. 2015-03 amending its rules regarding change to private fire protection and NSF Check administrative charges and recommending this Ordinance for hearing and adoption. Pursuant to the terms of IC 8-1.5-3-8.1 and Section 12.05.080(1) of the municipal code, this matter can only be introduced and set for public hearing. No further action may be taken. If introduced, a public hearing will be conducted on this ordinance at the Town Council meeting of Monday, March 23.)

Councilor Wagner introduced and filed the ordinance. There was no further action.

4. **Proposed Ordinance No. 1587:** An Ordinance Amending Chapter 10.45 of the Highland Municipal Code Regarding the Traffic Safety Commission for the Town of Highland, Indiana, Repealing all Ordinances in Conflict.

Councilor Vassar introduced and moved the consideration at the same meeting of introduction of Ordinance No. 1587. Councilor Zemen seconded. Upon a roll call vote, a unanimous vote being necessary, there were four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The ordinance could be considered at the same meeting of its introduction.

Councilor Vassar moved the passage and adoption at the same meeting of introduction of Ordinance No. 1587. Councilor Wagner seconded. Upon a roll call vote, a two-thirds vote being necessary, there were four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The ordinance could be considered at the same meeting of its introduction.

ORDINANCE NO. 1587 of the TOWN OF HIGHLAND, INDIANA

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 10.45 OF THE HIGHLAND MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING THE TRAFFIC SAFETY COMMISSION FOR THE TOWN OF HIGHLAND, INDIANA, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH.

WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland is the municipal legislative body of the unit;

WHEREAS, With the passage of time various Ordinances, Codes, and Procedures of the Town of Highland must be amended; and

WHEREAS, With the passage of time various practices, policies, and procedures must be updated; and

WHEREAS, The Town Council is interested in amending the Traffic Safety Commission Code to protect the public health, safety and welfare in all traffic safety programs to meet local needs, among others things; and

WHEREAS, The Town Council desires to amend the Traffic Safety Commission Code in order to insure public health, safety and welfare insofar as they are affected by traffic laws and traffic safety education within the Town of Highland, Indiana, and to provide that vehicle operators that do not comply with these provisions shall be penalized to provide a minimum level of health and safety as required herein;

WHEREAS, The Town Council desires to repeal portions of Chapter 10.45 in order to further perfect its organization and operation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

Section 1. That Section 10.45.030 (A) of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and be amended with a successor section, which shall be styled as 10.45.030 (A) and shall read as follows:

10.45.030 Organization of commission.

- (A) Membership.
 - (1) The commission shall consist of no less than six members, consisting of five persons representing the following departments or bodies:
 - (a) One from town council.
 - (a) Two from police department.
 - (b) One from fire department.
 - (c) One from department of public works.
 - (d) One police commissioner from the Town Board of Metropolitan Police Commissioners.
 - (2) The commission shall also consist of a representative from the Town Council, which may be held by a single member or alternating between several members of the Town Council as the Town Council may direct. Only one member at any given time may participate in a meeting of the Traffic Safety Commission.
 - (2) (3) The members of the commission shall be appointed by the Town Council and serve at its pleasure. The members described in subdivision (A)(1) and shall be appointed for serve a yearly three year term, expiring on from the First Monday in January—1st through December 31st, and until their successors are appointed and qualified, unless removed from the commission.
 - (4) The member(s) described in subdivision (A)(2) shall be appointed for a term co-extensive with the member's or members' term of office on the Town Council, unless the Town Council at its first regular meeting in any year, appoints another to serve as its representative(s).

Section 2. That the members serving on the Traffic Safety Commission at the time of the passage and adoption of this amendment shall continue to serve according to the terms of this amendment and for those members to whom it applies, shall serve a term ending on the first Monday in January 2018 and until a successor is appointed and qualified.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage and adoption as evidenced by the signature of the Town Council President and attested thereto by the Clerk-Treasurer, all pursuant to IC 36-5-2-10 and IC 36-5-2-10.2.

Introduced and Filed on the 9th Day of March 2015. Consideration on the same day or at same meeting of introduction sustained a vote of 4 in favor and 0 opposed, pursuant to IC 36-5-2-9.8.

AN ORDER AUTHORIZING and APPROVING a CONTRIBUTION to the HIGHLAND CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, in support of Its Best of Highland Awards Event, Particularly authorizing payment of event admission for Highland Employees and Officers Named as Finalists.

Whereas, The Town Council for the Town of Highland is the Legislative and Fiscal Body of the Municipality as well as the works board pursuant to IC 36-1-2 et seq.,and

Whereas, The Highland Chamber of Commerce, an Incorporated Association comprised of Representatives in the business sector of the Town, organized and conducted a first ever Best of Highland Awards Event, which had as its purpose the salutary recognition of individuals in the private and public sectors of the Town; and

Whereas, The Highland Chamber of Commerce, included the category entitled "Civil Servants, in which eighteen employees or officers of the Town of Highland were named as finalists in one of several subcategories;

Whereas, Under its authority of IC 36-1-3, The Town passed and adopted Section 2.35.030 of the Highland Municipal Code which provides in pertinent part that the Town Council is authorized to budget and appropriate funds from the general fund of the town to pay the expenses "incurred in promoting the best interests of the town" and that such expenses may include, but not necessarily be limited to those incurred in developing relations with other organizations oriented to advancing the positive community interest of Highland or any other expenses of civic or governmental nature deemed by the Town Council to be in the interests of the Town; and

Whereas, The Highland Chamber of Commerce, has requested that the tickets for each finalist be supported by the Town in order to promote the event's success, and to remove any economic barrier to award finalists who have an affiliation with the Town, that may bar participation;

Whereas, The Town Council has reviewed the matter, and in the interest of goodwill, comity and support of the Highland Chamber of Commerce and its Best of Highland Awards Event, now desires and elects

to authorize and approve contributions to Highland Chamber of Commerce in support of its Best of Highland Awards Event, with such contributions to be for the purchase of the event ticket in the amount of forty dollars (\$40.00) for each Highland municipal employee or officer named a finalist in consequence of the Best of Highland Awards and who also attends the event;

Now Therefore Be it hereby Ordered by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana;

Section 1. That in the interest of goodwill, comity and support of the Highland Chamber of Commerce and its Second Annual *Best of Highland Awards Event*, the Highland Town Council now does authorize and approve elective contributions to Highland Chamber of Commerce in support of its Best of Highland Awards Event, provided as follows:

- (a) That such elective contributions be based upon and in support of the purchase of the event ticket in the amount of forty dollars (\$40.00) for each Highland municipal volunteer, employee or officer named a finalist, as depicted on the accompanying exhibit, which is affixed and made a part of this order; and
- (b) That volunteer, employee or officer of the Town named a finalist in the Best of Highland Awards must also attend the event;

Section 2. That the Town Council hereby finds and determines that such an expense promotes the best interests of the Town, supports more perfect relations with the Highland Chamber of Commerce and is a lawful expense supporting activities which are of a civic or governmental nature;

Section 3. That the Town Council hereby further finds and determines that the number of eligible, volunteers, employees or officers is in the amount of thirteen (13) and the maximum contribution authorized by this order is fixed at five hundred, twenty dollars (\$520);

Section 4. The Clerk-Treasurer is hereby authorized to take such lawful steps necessary to carry out the purposes of this order.

6. **Sense of the Council Resolution No. 2015-12:** A Resolution Articulating The "Sense Of The Town Council" Regarding Its Support Of The USW Oil Workers Engaged In A Workforce Action For Fair Contracts And Safer Communities.

Councilor Wagner moved the passage and adoption of the Sense of the Council Resolution No. 2015-12. Councilor Zemen seconded. Upon a roll call vote, there were four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The resolution was adopted.

HIGHLAND TOWN COUNCIL Resolution No 2015-12

A RESOLUTION ARTICULATING THE "SENSE OF THE TOWN COUNCIL" REGARDING ITS SUPPORT of the USW OIL WORKERS ENGAGED IN A WORKFORCE ACTION FOR FAIR CONTRACTS AND SAFER COMMUNITIES

- **WHEREAS,** The Town of Highland, was incorporated to provide certain public services to the residents of this community, all of whom are also residents of this state, and Nation, for whom their elected public servants commit their judgement and industry to promote the general welfare and common public good;
- **WHEREAS,** The Highland Town Council, as the fiscal and legislative body of the Town of Highland, from time to time, encounters issues of public import and moment which invite an expression from the elected representatives as part of the public discourse on the matter;
- **WHEREAS,** Article 1, Section 31 of the Indiana Constitution provides that no law shall restrain any of the inhabitants of the State from assembling together in a peaceable manner, to consult for their common good, nor from instructing their representatives, nor from applying to the General Assembly for redress of grievances;
- **WHEREAS**, Thousands of USW represented oil workers across the country are currently engaged in an industry wide work action for fair contracts that improve occupational health and safety as well as the safety of the surrounding communities in which this important work is performed;
- **WHEREAS**, In our area, 1,100 members of USW Local 7-1 have been lawfully picketing the BP refinery since February 8, 2015, for the forgoing reasons; and,
- **WHEREAS** The Town of Highland by and through its elected officers wishes to offer a distinct, public expression on the public import of this matter,
- **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana that it is the sense of the Town Council of Highland is as follows:
 - **Section 1.** That the Highland Town Council, offering its sense of the subject, offers the following findings:
- (A) That the oil refining process involves toxic and reactive chemicals, explosive materials, extreme temperatures and high pressure;
- (B) That many oil refineries are critically understaffed, forcing workers into exhausting and brutally fatiguing schedules that compromise safe productivity and increase the risk of accidents;
- (C) That in the past five years, 27 workers have been killed and hundreds more seriously injured at work in the oil industry, adversely affecting families and communities in which they live;
- (D) That in the past eight years, there have been 349 accidental fires reported, many of which could have resulted in massive explosions, leaks or chemical releases into the surrounding communities;

- **Section 3.** That the Highland Town Council, offering its sense of the subject, commends the individual working men and women who are standing together in this earnest effort to promote fairness, advance a meaningful prosperity, from the board room to the break room, a healthy workforce, a safe workplace and safe community an effort that serves us all;

Section 4. That the Clerk-Treasurer be hereby further instructed to transmit and forward this resolution to such persons as may be deemed to have an interest in this matter and to encourage those persons to evidence their strong desire to see the objects and purposes of this "Sense of the Council Resolution" achieved.

It was noted that the letter would be distributed to the Town Council for its consideration in the Executive Session, imminently scheduled. Ms. Daniel recently experienced an un-elective separation from her position with the Town.
- 3. Sharron Warnecki, 3304 Condit, Highland, represented that she was a USW Oil worker affected by the BP situation. Ms. Warnecki expressed appreciation for the Town Council's passage of Resolution No. 2015-12.
- 4. Bridget DeYoung, 2645 37th Street, Highland, expressed disfavor that Dawn Diamantopolous was not appointed to serve as a member of the Town Theater Board of Directors. Ms. DeYoung expressed displeasure with the concern over Ms. Diamantopolous's non-appointment owing to the possible conflict of interest that could arise as she is married to an architect employed by the firm doing some preliminary design work on the project for the Redevelopment Commission. Ms. DeYoung expressed concern that Robin Carlascio of the Idea Factory was permitted to serve on the board while Idea Factory has a contract with the Town for the monthly newsletter.
