Highland's on the move in 2022

Long-vacant properties in downtown Highland are once again in high demand. A flurry of multimillion dollar developments are in the works. At the same time, the Redevelopment Commission has plans to add new signs that pair well with new lighting already in place throughout the downtown corridor. Redevelopment Director Kathy DeGuilio-Fox said all signs point to important projects in 2022.

[SENIOR LIVING DEVELOPMENT]

The Town Council voted Dec. 27 to approve an economic development package that sets the stage for construction of a senior living complex between Kleinman Road and Cline Avenue along Ernie Strack Drive. As part of the economic enhancements, the Russell Group will improve Ernie Strack Drive and complete the work necessary to disconnect the Griffland sanitary sewer from Griffith and connect it to the Highland sanitary district.


[FORMER BULT OIL PROPERTY]

Dormant for more than 20 years, the Redevelopment Commission is eager to see new construction on the former Bult Oil property. Ownership of the parcel is planned to be transferred in early 2022 from the town to the Eriks family, owner of Highland Body Shop. Early plans are for site remediation that will be followed by expansion of the body shop on the site.

[INNOVATIONS]

After installing EV chargers at the new downtown municipal parking lot, the Redevelopment Commission is continuing innovation and beautification efforts in 2022 by installing wayfinding signs that mirror the mid-century modern look and feel of Highland's downtown retail corridors. The project has been in the works for more than a year.





[NEW TASTING ROOM ON JEWETT]

Zorn Brew Works, known in Michigan City for the family brewing business that began 145 years ago, is bringing its name and experience to 2821 Jewett Street in 2022. Word is, the owners have plans to create a tasting room for microbrews and spirits and are eager to begin improvements. The Highland Redevelopment Commission approved the sale of the building to Zorn Brew Works late last year.

Town more efficient with tech upgrades

Highland's first Information Technology Director assumed the reins of the office in October and hit the ground running.

In just a few short months, Edward Dabrowski implemented new software and training for the building and zoning departments.

Next up are upgrades and efficiencies in the Water Department meter reading. Known as Neptune 360, the software is light years ahead of the current iPad readers. Using a device clipped to a belt, meter readers will be able to access comprehensive water reading information and store it digitally.

"This advance in water meter reading will make it possible to answer questions and inquiries from citizens about their account more quickly than ever before and pinpoint issues in record time," he said. "In December, we moved the town email system with enhanced security inhouse, which is another important step in efficiency and reliability."



[FIBER OPTIC AHEAD]

For 2022, Highland IT Director Ed Dabrowski is looking to upgrade all town IT services to fiber to increase speed and reliability.

Fiber optic cables are made up of thin strands of glass or plastic and increasingly favored over the more traditional ethernet cables. A fiber network will speed information transmission, vital when it comes to the working of the police and fire departments.

Department that was a separate department within the community.

Center, Sharp Athletic Complex and the four-mile Erie-Lackawanna Trail.
Now celebrating 75 years, the mission of Highland Parks and Recreation
remains the same — to enrich the community by providing safe, welcoming

PARKS CONTINUE TO ENRICH HIGHLAND

Consistently updating the five-year plan detailing the needs and wants of the community has been instrumental in continuing the growth and expansion of the parks for the past 75 years. As the community's expectations of recreational spaces have changed, so have Highland parks.

[UPGRADES & IMPROVEMENTS]

The Park Board and Highland Town Council are investing \$3.3 million in park upgrades, facilities improvements along with vehicle and equipment replacement beginning in 2022. Park Superintendent Alex Brown said highlights of the plan include:

- Bike trail improvements including solar lighting and crossing upgrades at Kennedy Avenue
- Development at Sheppard Park
- Expansion of pickleball courts at Meadows Park
- Upgrades to Sharp Athletic Complex

 New playgrounds at Homestead and Markley parks

When he thinks about the dozens of major projects and expansion of the park system over his more than 23 years at the helm of Highland Parks, Brown can conjure a mile-long list of accomplishments that resulted from the leadership of the Park Board and Town Council and enthusiasm for park projects, programs, leagues and enrichment. - Construction of the fieldhouse in 1998 and reconstruction of Lincoln Center
- Refurbishing and redesign of Main Square Park
- Construction of the new skate park at Sheppard
