- 2. Pre-Adoption Hearing of the Proposed Fiscal Year 2015 Budget of the Sanitary District, pursuant to IC 6-1.1-17-20. Under amendments to IC 6-1.1-17-20, the Sanitary District's governing body shall submit its proposed budget and property tax levies to the municipal fiscal body. The proposed budget and levy shall be submitted to the city or town fiscal body in the manner prescribed by the department of local government finance before September 2 of a year. The fiscal body of the city, town, or county (whichever applies) shall review each budget and proposed tax levy and adopt a final budget and tax levy for the taxing unit. IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED AND STIPULATED by all of the undersigned as follows: 1. The Building Corporation will acquire the real estate described in Exhibit A on September 30, 2014, the date of delivery of the Building Corporation's Ad Valorem Property Tax First Mortgage Bonds, Series 2014 (the "Bonds");

- 2. The Huntington National Bank has been selected to serve as Trustee under the Trust Indenture dated as of August 15, 2014, which secures the Bonds; and
- 3. Following the sale of the Bonds, the rental shall be reduced to reflect the amount of debt service on the Bonds rounded up to the next \$1,000 level plus \$10,000, pursuant to the Lease. The rental shall be as set forth in Exhibit B attached hereto.

6. **Proposed Ordinance No. 1568.1549-B:** An Ordinance to Amend the Wage and Salary Ordinance of the Town of Highland.

ORDINANCE No. 1569 of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA

AN ORDINANCE to AMEND CHAPTER 10.20 of the HIGHLAND MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING to MOTOR VEHICLES and TRAFFIC, PROVIDING for the ENFORCEMENT THEREOF, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES in CONFLICT THEREWITH, and DECLARING an EMERGENCY

- WHEREAS, The Traffic Safety Commission and the Town Board of Metropolitan Police Commissioners have conducted a study and investigation as to the amendments to Article 10 of the Highland Municipal Code within the Town of Highland;
- WHEREAS, I.C. 9-21-1 et sequitur authorizes the Town of Highland, through its Town Council as a local authority to adopt local regulations regarding traffic; and
- WHEREAS, I.C. 9-21-1-3(a)(13) specifically authorizes the Town of Highland, through its Town Council as a local authority to adopt local regulations regarding traffic control on public school grounds when requested by the governing body of the school corporation; and
- WHEREAS, It would be and is in the best interest of the Town of Highland to amend the following sections of the Highland Municipal Code;
- Now, Therefore, Be it hereby ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:
 - **Section 1.** That Section 10.20.050 "Stopping, standing or parking on parkway" of the Highland Municipal Code be amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following successor section, to be styled as Section 10.20.050 which shall be entitled and read as follows:

10.20.050 Stopping, standing or parking on parkway

- (A) Except as provided in subsection 10.20.050 (B), no person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle on a parkway where curbs exist. Parkway shall be the place between the sidewalk and the curb, as defined in Section 8.20.010.
- (B) The provisions of subsection 10.20.050, shall not apply in the following instances:
 - 1. When necessary to avoid a conflict with other traffic,
 - 2. In compliance with the law,
 - 3. When complying with the directions of a police officer or traffic control device, or
 - 4. When the prohibition of parkway parking has been expressly exempted and listed in Section 10.20.050 (C) of this Code.
- (C) The parkways located at 8910 Grace Street, 8910 Cottage Grove Place are exempted from the provisions of Section 10.20.050 (A).
- **Section 2.** (a) That the Highland Municipal Code be amended by creating a new Section to be numbered 10.20.185, Styled as "Parking Limited to Certain Vehicles during certain hours" to read as follows:

10.20.185 Parking Limited to Certain Identified Vehicles during certain hours.

When signs are erected in each block giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle accept those that may be expressly identified and authorized by this code between the hours specified in HMC 10.35.075 of any day except Sundays and legal holidays within the district or upon any of the streets described in HMC 10.35.075.

(b) That the Highland Municipal Code be further amended by adding a new section to be numbered That Section 10.35.075, Schedule VI-A "Parking Limited to Certain Identified Vehicles during certain hours" to read as follows:

Section 3. That the proper officer be hereby directed to erect appropriate signs, properly citing the traffic or parking regulation herein, to support the enforcement of the provisions herein;

Section 4. All provisions of ordinances in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Section 5. Whereas an emergency exists, this Ordinance shall become and be in full force and effect from and after the date of its adoption, passage and publication in the manner prescribed by law and until its subsequent amendment or repeal by proper ordinance.

Introduced and Filed on the 13th Day of October 2014. Consideration on same day or at same meeting of introduction sustained a vote 5 in favor and 0 opposed, pursuant to IC 36-5-2-9.8.
