With snow right around the corner, Public Works Director Mark Knesek is reminding everyone: the town winter parking ban requires all vehicles to be off streets when snow totals equal two inches on the ground. Violation of the rules means fines and impounding fees.

"Ideally, residents and visitors would move their cars to their driveway or other off-street locations as soon as snow is predicted," Knesek said. "It makes it safer and faster for crews to clear the streets curb-to-curb when we don't have vehicles blocking the way."

Town Councilman Mark Schocke was able to experience plowing firsthand earlier this year.

"It is amazing to see how plow drivers are able to maneuver these very large, heavy trucks in very tight spaces," Schocke said. "They shouldn't have to avoid parked cars to get the job done."



[PARKING BAN]

All on-street parking is banned when there is more than two inches of new-fallen snow. This allows plows to do their jobs in the first critical hours after snowfall.



[SNOW REMOVAL]

The Highland noise ordinance bans the use of snowblowers and snowplows in residential neighborhoods between midnight and 6 a.m. If you contract for snow removal, please ask the company to schedule your service between 6 a.m. and midnight to avoid disturbing neighbors.




