Highland welcomes out-of-district students

The School Town had a seamless application and vetting process this spring and is planning to welcome an estimated 120 new students this month as part of its Out-of-District program, now in its second year.

This year, the administration made a decision to limit outof-district admissions to those children who will be entering kindergarten through Grade 7.

Superintendent Brian Smith said it is in the best interests of students to begin their new academic careers while still in elementary and middle schools.

"We had a phenomenal year in 2023-2024. It was a learning year, too," Smith said.

"What we found is that students in Grades 8-12 tend to have more challenges adapting to a new learning environment," he said. "We are eager to welcome all of our students and look forward to a productive year of learning."

HOW IT WORKS

Earlier this year, school leaders determined how many students per grade the district could accommodate this school year. The goal: Fill classes in Grades K-7 to their optimum number.

Asst. Superintendent Ryan Erdelac said parents were asked to complete a two step process, one online and the other in person, to be considered eligible for an available spot. The district is expecting about 120 new students out of the 143 applications accepted. Here's the breakdown by grade:

New fall sports program – Unified Bocce – open to students of all abilities

The Highland Athletics Department has added Unified Bocce as a new sport for this school year, thanks to a Highland High School Student Athlete Leadership Committee initiative.

Athletic Director Ryan Harrington said Highland is eager to participate with at least one team coached by Brett Jennnings.

Unified Bocce joins people with and without intellectual disabilities in equal numbers on

the same team. Unified Bocce is inspired by the ideal of students training and playing together, developing friendships and understanding along the way.

"Our student athletes wanted to create a more inclusive school environment," he said.

"There are a great many unified sports available and most schools take part in them. This is just a starting point for us. We believe everyone deserves the chance to play."

Teachers participate in state literacy program, bringing key reading initiatives to classrooms

Many School Town of Highland educators including Warren teachers Gina Ensell, Annamarie Pizer, Julie Terry and Jamie Wilson spent a portion of their summer diving into the state's new Keys to Literacy program – joining other instructors around the state.

The training involved coursework conducted via Zoom on seven consecutive Mondays and assignments that were completed outside of the instructional days.

All Pre-K through Grade 6 teachers – including special education – will need to complete 80 hours of professional development on the science of reading concepts followed by a written exam.

Without the training and passing of the state exam, Indiana teachers will not be able to renew their licenses beginning in 2027.

The Highland group overwhelmingly agreed they learned new methods that will be an asset to students in Highland.

Wilson, who has a master's degree in education and has been teaching kindergarten at Highland for 26 years, described the classwork as intense and worthwhile.

"Early literacy is important to me and vital to the students I teach," she said. "As part of this training, I learned teaching methods for reading I wished I would have been taught in college.

ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The three components of the Indiana Keys to Literacy curriculum are:

- » 40-hour Keys to Beginning Reading
- 15-hour Keys to Early Writing (Prek-Grade 2) or Keys to Content Writing (Grade 3 and up)
- » 25-hour Independent Learning Tasks

As a kindergarten teacher, my job is to teach foundational reading skills. This training was beneficial."

Pizer, a 20-year veteran educator who teaches Grade 5, saw the training as an opportunity to refresh her skills.

"They focused on reading comprehension, how to ask kids questions and graphic organizers that help students hone their writing skills," she said.

"Writing is a struggle for many of my students. As part of this course, I learned new ways to help them write and stay on topic. We also learned about new techniques to teach children with dyslexia. I'll be incorporating what I learned in my classes this year."
