COMMISSION SEEKS INPUT ON 20-YEAR MASTER PLAN

The Redevelopment Commission is appealing to residents to become a voice for Highland's tomorrow.

Utilizing the valued input of those who participate, the commission will draft a plan to guide development for the next 20 years.

The goal: Chart a fresh course that benefits the community economically while taking into consideration quality of life, services and character.

"Essential to this plan is the full engagement of our residents," Redevelopment Director Maria Becerra said. "Residents are encouraged to participate actively, share their ideas, concerns and aspirations for the town's future."

The first Input session in December will launch the year-long process.

"We will disseminate information through the town website, local businesses, the library and Lincoln Community Center," she said. "We want the comprehensive plan to reflect the vision and values of our community as it offers guidance for planning and development."

Highland police launch trading cards

Highland Police and the Rotary Club have joined forces to create a contest for children that features a deck of 41 incredibly unique trading cards.

You won't find a joker in the mix. What you will find are a series of cards featuring HPD members, like Police Chief Ralph Potesta, Sgt. Lee Natelborg and Patrol Officer Alexis Gerolimos.

With one card dedicated to each sworn member of the police department including patrol officers, detectives and administrators – the object of the contest is to be the first child in town to collect all 41 trading cards.

Cards went into circulation in October with a deadline to collect the entire set by December 9. If there is no winner by that date, the contest - open to Highland kids ages 5-13 – will continue.

Each HPD officer has 100 of their personal trading cards. A child and his/ her parents can approach an officer and request their card.
