HIGHLAND GIRLS HIT THE MAT

A decision by the governing board of Indiana prep sports to add girls wrestling to its roster was met with jubilation by girls around the state.

No where is that enthusiasm more apparent than in Highland, where more than 20 girls are eager to become part of the first group of young women to catapult their sport – and their team – onto the stage of elite high school athletics.

Highland Athletic Director Ryan Harrington said the Indiana High School Athletic Association's timing is perfect.

"This is an up-and-coming sport. All of the data shows girls wrestling is the fastest growing sport in the nation," Harrington said.

"The NCAA recognizes girls wrestling at the college level and scholarship opportunities are expanding," he said. "We have been fortunate to see the dynamic growth right here at the Highland schools."

After years of promoting wrestling for boys – and girls – at the elementary level, competitive wrestling has blossomed at Highland with state- and nationally-ranked female wrestlers.

"I am really excited," Harrington said.
"This is a great opportunity for ladies to participate in the sport. It's fun to see the excitement growing."


